

WHY DO WE KEEP TIME?



I had a wonderful time visiting with Caroline Breard's third grade class at Dunham. She asked me to come talk about what Lent means. So I asked the children how long before their birthdays they actually started thinking about their birthdays. Some said a month, some said all year! I asked the same about Christmas. We agreed that anticipating a celebration makes it all the better.

Every spring, Christ's people celebrate his resurrection. But for centuries and centuries, we've been making plans to think more about Jesus *before* Easter. We get ready to celebrate by taking more time to think about his life and death.

We also talked about football games (how can you not in Baton Rouge???). They agreed that a great game is *not* a 72-0 blow out against a junior college. A great game is a close struggle. The greatest games include come backs, when it looked like all was lost. That's why we think about Jesus' death before we celebrate his resurrection. It was the greatest struggle of all time. And it looked like the game was over when Jesus died. But then in the most wonderful surprise, the Father raised Jesus. The more we think about his ministry and his dying, the more joy we have at Easter.



These are sharp kids. They got it. We get it too. We keep time with Jesus during Lent so that we can join our story to his story. So his victory over death can be our victory.

I'm so proud of you when I think how you are pressing in close to Jesus this Lent. Connecting psalms with events in Jesus' life, and praying alongside him takes energy, imagination and discipline. But you're doing it! As an early Easter arrives at the end of this month, keep preparing, dear church. We're going to have quite a celebration.

You'll want to plan now for the fun of Palm Sunday, March 24, the deep passion of the Service of Shadows on March 28, and the release of Easter joy on March 31. I love being your pastor, especially at this time of year.

The word "Shekinah" literally means "that which dwells," but is commonly used to denote the glory of the divine presence of God, often represented as light. What a beautiful and apt name

for this young lady. Shekinah, now in fifth grade, was in Kindergarten when her family found Gardere Community Christian School. Her loving nature and infectious smile lights up a room and warms the hearts of all who meet her. Her story exemplifies the three pillars of the school—academics, spiritual instruction and family.

Shekinah is a high-achieving student who challenges herself to grow <u>academically</u>. This past year, she scored "Mastery" in reading and "Advanced" in all other subjects on state standardized testing. She also participates in many programs that the school offers, including Manners of the Heart, Girls on the Run, Bible study group, Crochet Club, piano lessons and the GCCS/Kids Hope USA mentoring program. She even shares her joy of learning with younger children as a volunteer at Story Time Saturdays.



<u>Spiritually</u>, Shekinah shines the light of Jesus. She is a dedicated Bible reader and loves Chapel. Her favorite subject is Bible class where she and her classmates dig into Scripture analyzing passages and making historical connections. She even participates in an out-of-school Bible study taught by one of the school's teachers. The partnership between GCCS and Manners of the Heart offers Shekinah tangible ways to share God's love with manners and respect.

Shekinah's <u>family</u> has found a home at Gardere Community Christian School. Her mother began as a volunteer and is now an assistant teacher in one of the GCCS preschool classrooms. Showing much promise, she was encouraged to pursue higher education. This young mother will receive her bachelor's degree in Early Childhood Education soon. Shekinah's older brother and sister graduated from the school and are now on scholarship and on the honor roll at Parkview Baptist School. The future shines bright for this family!

While Shekinah's story sounds ideal, it is not as uncommon as some may think. On the 2023 state tests, GCCS students scored 30% higher than the district average and almost three times higher than the two other public schools in the vacinity. Our students are going on to

find success all over the city. So far, all GCCS graduates have stayed in school, getting their high school diploma or its equivalent, and 87% of those graduates are enrolled in college. Additionally, GCCS has encouraged and helped several parents get their degrees and currently have six

parents employed at the school.

The Gardere Community Christian School is a shining light in a community that struggles with so much darkness. Our First Presbyterian Church family plays a key role in fueling that light with your prayers, your time as volunteers and your financial support. Thank you!

HOLY WEEK

PALM SUNDAY

We joyfully welcome back our annual Palm Sunday festival on March 24. The congregation will process around North Boulevard promptly at 10 am followed by a combined worship celebration in the Sanctuary. Join us for a catfish fry lunch after worship (\$5 for children 12 and younger; \$15 for those 13 and older) with fun activities for the children: egg hunt (further details below), face painting, a balloon artist and a petting zoo. Casual dress is encouraged. Overflow parking will be available in the Old Governor's Mansion lot on North Blvd.

Easter Egg Hunt: If you would like your child in third grade and below to participate, please bring 12 plastic filled eggs per child and place in the large baskets stationed at various entrances to the church prior to 10 am. Please make sure your eggs are lightly taped shut. NO candy with nuts or peanut butter. Remember that chocolate candy tends to melt in warmer weather. You are welcome to put Easter stickers or other non-edible treats inside eggs if you like. The hunt begins following the service. We ask that parents assist their children by limiting their finds to 12 eggs per child. More details to come.

MAUNDY THURSDAY SERVICE OF SHADOWS: MARCH 28 AT 7 PM

Before we join our Lord in celebrating the glorious joy of his rising from the dead, we must endure with him the agony of the cross. In this special service, we will meet with Jesus in the upper room and hear him say, "I have earnestly desired to eat this Passover meal with you before I suffer." In remembrance of him, we will come to the table of holy communion. In hushed reverence, we will see him laid in the tomb.



EASTER SUNDAY

We gather around the empty tomb in the Terraced Garden March 31 for a brief sunrise service at 6.30 am followed by breakfast. We will also have two festive worship services in the Sanctuary at 9 am and 11 am. If rain, the sunrise service will meet in Dunham Chapel. Sunday school classes will meet as usual. Don't forget to bring fresh flowers to decorate our Easter cross which will be on North Boulevard.
